How to Conduct a Systematic Review/Meta-analysis

Conducting a systematic review/meta-analysis is a complex process requiring an understanding of all the necessary steps in order to produce a review of high quality, content, and minimum bias. TTUHSC Libraries subscribe to Cochrane Interactive Learning: Conducting an Intervention Review.

CIL was "developed by world-leading experts, (and) this course provides over 15 hours of self-directed learning on conducting a complete systematic review process for both new and experienced review authors." Modules are designed to be learned at your pace at any time - no completion deadline is required by Cochrane! It is a set of eleven course modules including:

- 1) Introduction to conducting systematic reviews
- 2) Writing the review protocol
- 3) Searching for studies
- 4) Selecting studies and collecting data
- 5) Introduction to study quality and risk of bias
- 6) Analyzing the data
- 7) Interpreting the findings
- 8) Reporting the review
- 9) Introduction to health economics
- 10) Network meta-analysis
- 11) Health equity in systematic reviews

Modules have "clear explanations with stimulating interactions, quizzes, animations, examples and reference resources." Upon finishing each module, a Certificate of Completion is available for you. The NIH and FDA Lead the Way in 3D Printing

From models to medical devices

Wondering where you can find information about 3D printing and médical devices? Here are two resources to explore:

The NIH 3D Print Exchange allows for the creation and sharing of biomedical 3D print files, modeling tutorials and educational materials.

The NIH 3D Print Exchange hosts web-based tools able to automatically generate 3D model files from 3D molecular and medical imaging data.

Some of the models include labware such as a centrifuge adapter or live cell microscopy chamber

Another resource for <u>3D printing of medical devices</u> can be found at the FDA. The site outlines a variety of topics such as types of commercially available <u>3D printed medical devices</u> and explaining the <u>FDA's role in 3D printing of medical devices</u>.


Both resources, the NIH and FDA, provide a substantial introduction into the world of 3D printing and medical devices.
