Texas Pharmacy Museum Takes Old-Time Pharmacy to the Public

Since it opened in 1998, the Texas Pharmacy Museum, located in the basement of our Amarillo campus, has participated in the Fannin Middle School Heritage Festival in Amarillo. The festival, which set an attendance record this year with more than 2,000 visitors, coincides with National Pharmacy Week and provides a wonderful opportunity to inform school age children, their families and the general public about present and past aspects of our profession.

This year <u>Dr. Paul Katz (Associate Professor, Dept. of Pharmacy Practice – Amarillo and Texas Pharmacy Museum Curator)</u> demonstrated pill rolling using Play Dough, a hand operated pill machine and a mortar and pestle. He also used Pop Tarts to make a sugar coating for the Play Dough pills. P2 students <u>Dionne Brown, Deirdre Delea, Fernando Jaquez, Mark King and Penny Sitka</u> helped Dr. Katz with the demonstration, as did <u>Shanna James</u>, a pre-pharmacy major from WTAMU. Visitors watched the staff demonstrate the different processes and were then given an opportunity to work with the devices themselves.

Dr. Katz and the museum also participated in the 10th annual New Mexico Archaeology and History Fair, which took place Nov. 4-5 in Artesia, NM. This fair is held in a different New Mexico city each year. Dr. Katz says Artesia was particularly appropriate for the appearance of the museum's *Chuck Wagon Therapy* exhibit because that community was situated along two of the most used and famous cattle trails—the Goodnight-Loving and the Chisum.

The Chuck Wagon Therapy exhibit demonstrates the medical, dental and pharmaceutical tools and supplies that were carried on the cattle drives of the late 19th century. The display uses a replica of the chuck box that would have been placed at the end of the chuck wagon and is accurate, informative and colorful. All the information used to assemble the display was obtained from an article written in 1936 by a pharmacist who, as a teenager, actually participated in cattle drives from Texas to Montana. It has previously been exhibited at the annual Fannin Middle School Heritage Festival and at the Texas Pharmacy Association annual meeting. It is scheduled to appear at several chuck wagon cook-offs in 2006 can be viewed in the Texas Pharmacy Museum when not on the trail.

Dr. David Allen to be Founding Dean at Ohio Pharmacy School

In 1996, Dr. Patry was recruited by TTUHSC - SOP to be a founding faculty member and Associate Dean for Patient Care. Since that time, he has also served as Executive Associate Dean and in his current position as Chair, Clinical Practice & Management, Department of Pharmacy Practice.

Dr. Patry has received many awards and honors for service to the profession and teaching awards from both the University of Houston and Texas Tech. Among these are distinguished service awards from TSHP and TPA; a TTUHSC President's Distinguished Faculty Service Award; a SOP Pharmacy Service Award; and a selection as a Top 50 Outstanding Alumni from the UH College of Pharmacy. He was elected three times as Chair for the ASHP House of Delegates and served on the ASHP Board of Directors.
