Regional Dean Selected for Abilene



It gives me great pleasure to announce that <u>*Dr. Kim Powell*</u> has been named regional dean for the new SOP regional campus in Abilene. She will begin her new responsibilities Jan. 17.

Since 2002 Dr. Powell has served as clinical specialist in managed care for Scott and White Prescription Services in Temple, but she has a wide range of experience in chain, independent, consultant and institutional pharmacy practice. She has also served on our Dean's Advisory Council since 2004 and is extremely knowledgeable about our program.

Dr. Powell received her B.S. degree in pharmacy in 1981 from the University of Houston and began her pharmacy career shortly thereafter when she went to work for Inman Pharmacy in Belton. She spent the next 15 years in Waco working at various times as a staff pharmacist, pharmacist-in-charge, pharmacy manager and consultant for Revco Drug, Skaggs Alpha Beta, Super Sav Drug and H.E. Butt Grocery Company.

In 1999 Dr. Powell earned her M.S. degree in pharmacy administration from the University of Texas, and in 2001 she earned her Pharm.D. from the University of Houston College of Pharmacy. In 2002 she completed a specialty pharmacy residency in drug information at the University of Texas at Austin and Scott & White Memorial Hospital in Temple.

In addition to her current responsibilities with Scott and White, Dr. Powell served as director of pharmacy services for Coryell Memorial Hospital in Gatesville from 1999-2004. She also owned and served as pharmacist-in-charge for White Bear Pharmacy in Gatesville from 1998-2001.

Dr. Powell and her husband, Mike, have a 7-year old daughter. She also has two stepsons: 26-year old Cody is an infantry-medic specialist for the U.S. Army and 24-year old Justin works for Carter & Burgess in Dallas.

We are fortunate to have someone with Dr. Powell's experience join our program and I look forward to her work with our faculty, chairs and associate deans in coordinating the development of the Abilene campus.
