Renowned Researcher Visits SOP

Dr. Thomas R. Kosten, one of the premier addiction investigators in the world, was the featured speaker when the SOP hosted the Wendy and Stanley Marsh 3 Endowed Lectureship in Pharmacology and Neurochemistry of Substance Abuse/Addiction on March 16. Getting the chance to hear such an accomplished researcher speak about his work was very interesting and informative, to say the least, and we certainly want to thank the Mr. And Mrs. Marsh 3 for making such events possible.

Dr. Kosten is a professor of psychiatry and medicine at Yale University Medical School and deputy chief of psychiatry at VA Connecticut. He has been supported by a Research Scientist Award from the National Institutes of Health since 1987 and directs the Yale Medications Development Center for substance abuse. He is also a past president of the American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry, has served as a Congressional Fellow in the House of Representatives and is the founding vice chair for added qualifications in addiction psychiatry of the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology.

His recent work includes serving on the National Academy of Sciences, Institute of Medicine Committee on ethical issues in developing vaccines for substance abuse. His research includes treating cocaine-induced cerebral perfusion defects, as detected with SPECT neuroimaging, and predicting pharmacotherapy outcome based on functional MRI brain activation during cocaine cue-induced craving. His medication contributions include developing a cocaine vaccine, immunotherapy for hallucinogens, buprenorphine for opioid dependence, disulfiram for cocaine dependence, vasodilators for cocaine-induced cerebral perfusion defects and using combined medications with contingency management for opioid and cocaine dependence.

The Wendy and Stanley Marsh 3 Endowed Lectureship in Pharmacology and Neurochemistry of Substance Abuse/Addiction is funded by the Marshes to give TTUHSC - SOP national recognition in the pharmacological area of substance abuse and the neurochemistry that precipitates this type of addictive behavior. It's an annual event featuring speakers of the highest national reputation.
