

ABBRUSCATO EARNS PROFESSORSHIP



In August, the Texas Tech University System Board of Regents approved the appointment of Thomas J. Abbruscato, Ph.D., senior associate dean of the TTUHSC Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, as a Grover E. Murray Professor. The Grover E. Murray Professorship is intended for faculty members who have attained national and international distinction in their fields for outstanding research, excellence in scholarship and creative achievement.

FOUR FACULTY AWARDED GRANTS









Over the last few months, four of our faculty members received grants to support their work.

Ron Hall, PharmD, was awarded an investigator-initiated grant (Total Costs: \$172,800) from the Merck Investigator Studies Program entitled "A retrospective cohort study using Cerner Real-World Data to evaluate the use ceftolozane/tazobactam in patients with bacteremia due to gram-negative pathogens". The grant will support Hall and his team over one year to determine the impact of ceftolozane/tazobactam on 30-day failure rates of patients with bacteremia due to Pseudomonas aeruginosa compared to other standard-of-care antibiotics. They will also conduct a similar analysis for gram-negative pathogens other than P. aeruginosa andevaluate the use of ceftolozane/tazobactam in patients with gram-negative bacteremia over a seven-year period. The study will be conducted using a national cohort from Cerner Real-World Data, which consists of more than 100 million patients.

Irene La-Beck, PharmD, was awarded a \$2,370,000 R01 grant from the National Cancer Institute for her project titled "Cholesterol metabolism in the pharmacology of liposomal therapeutics." La-Beck will collaborate with Dr. Zhang from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill to identify novel mechanisms by which liposomes are metabolized within the body, determine metabolites that alter immune function, and develop new formulations of liposomal chemotherapies for the treatment of cancer that are expected to be both safer and more effective.

Ashley Selby, PharmD, assistant professor of pharmacy practice, was awarded a health disparities grant from TTUHSC for a project entitled "Evolution of Potential Disparities in the Treatment of Candidemia in Obese Patients." The grant will support Selby and the team over a one year period to determine the impact of obesity on in-hospital mortality in patients treated for candidemia from 2013-2022 in three hospitals located in Amarillo, Fort Worth, and Lubbock. The analysis will be conducted in collaboration with Chip Shaw, PhD, executive director of the TTUHSC Central Data Warehouse.

Jenny Wilkerson, PhD, is the principal investigator of a new \$1.9M NIH R35 grant from the National Institute of General Medical Sciences (NIGMS) that will be completed at the Amarillo campus over the next five years. The project will examine sex hormone alteration on post-operative pain development and treatment. The critical work will help to enhance understanding of sex hormone alterations within vulnerable patient populations, the role of sex hormones on healing after surgery, and clarify analgesic treatment options.

Thanks to a 2020 CPRIT grant that funded the purchase of three state-of-the-art imaging instruments, and a new USDA subcontract, Ulrich Bickel, M.D., associate professor and associate dean of sciences, will collaborate on a study with the Texas Tech University School of Veterinary Medicine in Amarillo. The collaboration could be the first of many.

In a list published by the National Academy of Inventors, the Texas Tech University System, including TTUHSC, ranked 75th among the Top 100 U.S. Universities Granted Utility Patents in 2022.


HALL PRESENTS AT CPRIT INNOVATIONS CONFERENCE

Ron Hall, PharmD, presented a research poster entitled "Impact of Class II/III Obesity on Doxorubicin Pharmacokinetics in Women with Breast Cancer" at the Innovations in Cancer Prevention and Research Conference. The conference highlighted exceptional progress across cancer research, prevention, and product development at medical and academic research centers, in communities, and at companies around Texas. Hall's study was funded by the TTUHSC Laura W. Bush Women's Health Research Institute and his SOP co-authors on the project included Drs. Trey Putnam and Raja Reddy.




KLEIN FEATURED IN APHA SERIES

In September, Pharmacy Times put together an article series for the American Pharmacists Association (APhA) that highlights vaccine confidence. TTUHSCSOP's Mary Klein, PharmD, associate professor at the Abilene campus, was among the pharmacists featured.



FACULTY MANUSCRIPT PUBLISHED

The collaboration of three faculty members, Nadia German, PhD; Thomas Abbruscato, PhD; and Lance McMahon, PhD, resulted in the investigation of novel kappa opioid receptor ligands to treat pain. The trio published their manuscript, titled "Studies on diketopiperazine and dipeptide analogs as opioid receptor ligands," in the European Journal of Medicinal Chemistry.



ANNUAL SYMPOSIUM BRINGS RESEARCHERS TOGETHER

On October 27, the sixth annual Abilene Interdisciplinary Symposium on Cancer and Biomedical Research was held on the Abilene campus. Keynote speakers included Manish Aghi, MD, PhD, professor of neurological surgery at the University of California's Weill Institute for Neurosciences School of Medicine and Michael C. Wiener, PhD, professor and department chair for the department of cell physiology & molecular biophysics at TTUHSC School of Medicine. The event, which invites students and researchers from far and wide to come together, also included distinguished speakers from TTUHSC, Abilene Christian University and Hendrick Medical Center, and student poster presentations.









WHITE COAT CEREMONIES WELCOME CLASS OF 2027

The TTUHSC Jerry H. Hodge School of Pharmacy welcomed the Class of 2027 with white coat ceremonies at the Dallas, Abilene and Amarillo campuses. The annual events invited family members and friends to watch as the school's incoming students receive their traditional white pharmacy coats, sign the Pharmacist Code of Conduct and recite the Oath of a Pharmacist for the first time. For incoming students, receiving the white coat is a reminder of the commitment they are making to an honorable and trusted profession.

STUDENTS ATTEND LEADERSHIP RETREAT



In August, students from all four campuses had the opportunity to attend the annual Student Leadership Retreat. This year's Harry Potter themed retreat, held at the Abilene campus, explored "The Magical World of Leadership." The two-day event included a service project where students and team members packed 1,500 weekend food packs at CarePacks for Kids, multiple sessions covering leadership topics, a keynote address from Professor and Dean Emeritus Arthur Nelson, and networking activities.

TTUHSC RECEIVES FIRST EVER VEERA

For the first time, <u>TTUHSC</u> has received a Veterans Education Excellence Recognition Award (VEERA) from the <u>Texas Veterans</u>
<u>Commission</u>. The VEERA program recognizes public colleges' and universities' excellence in providing education and related services to veterans and the military-connected community.



FALL MED CLEANOUT CYCLE CONCLUDES

In October, the Texas Panhandle Poison Center (TPPC) hosted collection events at the TTUHSC Lubbock, Abilene and Amarillo campuses. Community members were able to drop off unwanted medicines and sharps to dispose of them in a free, legal and environmentally responsible manner. School of Pharmacy student volunteers had the opportunity to collaborate with students from other TTUHSC schools and see first-hand the issues with non-adherence to medications. Similarly, students at the Dallas campus participated in the DEA National Drug Take Back Day event.

- The Lubbock event collected 796 pounds of unused or expired medication and 109 pounds of sharps from 240 cars.
- The Abilene event collected 371 pounds of unused or expired medication and 56.5 pounds of sharps from 146 cars.
- The Amarillo event collected 1488.5 pounds of unused or expired medication and 227.5 pounds of sharps from 359 cars.



IPE EVENT OFF TEAM BASED CARE

EXPERIENCE

With an interprofessional education (IPE) schedule that kicked off in August, students have been busy working with students from the TTUHSC Schools of Medicine and Nursing and other schools to learn about teamwork, team based care, patient safety, effective communication and more.

IPE is an important part of all health professionals' education, as it gives students from different specialties the valuable opportunity to work together as a healthcare team to optimize patient care and safety.



One student had this to say of their experience, "I learned that patient care is more advanced when we all work together. We can more effectively treat our patient when we respect each other's expertise knowledge."

SEMINARS ADDRESS PHARMACY PRACTICE ISSUES

Our career development programing has featured three seminars, open to all students and team members, designed to provide opportunities to learn about pharmacy practice issues. The seminars have brought guests from CVS and Walgreens and the President of the American College of Clinical Pharmacy (ACCP) to our campuses.



TTUHSC REVEALS FUTURE OF HEALTH



In September, TTUHSC revealed a new look with the launch of its refreshed brand. The complete overhaul aligns with the mission, culture and values of the university with the look and feel of everything from advertising to business cards. To celebrate the milestone, brand launch events boasting the new future of health look were held at each campus.

STUDENTS MAKE IMPACT THROUGH HEALTH FAIRS

On October 14, the Student College of Clinical Pharmacy helped organize a health fair booth at the Plano International Festival. Dallas students provided blood pressure and blood glucose screenings to 74 patients. A few days later, students at the Amarillo campus joined the Texas Tech University School of Veterinary Medicine as they hosted the OneHealth Clinic at Guyon Saunders Resource Center. The event benefited individuals experiencing homelessness and their pets. Under the supervision of faculty, pharmacy students provided flu vaccines, and blood pressure and blood glucose checks, while veterinary medicine students provided physical exams and annual vaccinations for pets, including rabies vaccinations.





TTUHSC WELL REPRESENTED AT ASCP

Tell us about yourself: I am from Arlington, TX (home of your 2023 World Series champion Texas Rangers) and completed my PharmD at TTUHSC in 2011. After completing residency training at UT Southwestern in Dallas, TX and The Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore, MD and Master's coursework at Johns Hopkins University, I practiced in ambulatory care for the Johns Hopkins Health System. In this role, I grew into responsibilities in value based care, population health management, and predictive analytics in partnership with the Johns Hopkins School of Public Health.

Where do you practice now? Martin is now an Associate Director for Optum Insight, responsible for pharmacy analytics—specifically supporting drug-use related modules within several products for patients' risk stratification and population health management. In addition to this analytical work, I consult on drug studies with health outcomes and economics researchers elsewhere in Optum. I work remotely and live in Maryland, between Baltimore and Washington DC.

Training at Texas Tech, especially with faculty at the Dallas campus generally and with those focused on ambulatory care specifically, helped provide a foundation for the variety of skills and responsibilities I gained throughout my career. As a result of the rigorous coursework and experiential training, I was well-suited to succeed in jobs/roles that have evolved over time.

What are your favorite things to do outside of pharmacy?

When not working, I like to travel, sample craft beer (and brew it occasionally), dabble in woodworking, and spend time with my kiddo and wife.
