Then I took the other, as just as fair, And having perhaps the better claim, Because it was grassy and wanted wear; Though as for that the passing there Had worn them really about the same,



Buddy Holly Statue and Walk of Fame is a lasting tribute to Lubbock's most famous son and to people from the West Texas area who have contributed to the entertainment field.

Prairie Dog Town is one of the few remaining colonies of its type in the nation offering entertaining hours to children and adults.

The infamous strip offers an assortment of libations.









Ranching Heritage Center of the Museum of Texas Tech University depicts the real history of America's West through the restoration of historical ranch structures which have been moved to an outdoor 12-acre site.

Buffalo Springs Lake 9 miles southeast of Lubbock offers facilities for fishing, skiing, picnics, speed boat races, camping, paddle boats and many other special programs including a nature trail and a new beach area that has been developed.

Snow skiers are happy to discover that Lubbock is just five hours by car from excellent New Mexico ski resorts.

The Municipal Garden & Arts Center hold flower and art shows all year. Lubbock's climate is semi-arid and mild. Cool nights and warm days predominate, with low levels of relative humidity. Most of the annual rainfall occurs during the months of May, June, and July.

Llano Estacado Winery located 3.2 miles east of U.S. 87 Hwy on FM 1585 houses Texas' largest winery. European and Californian varieties of grapes grown within 60-mile radius of Lubbock.

Yellow House Canyon Lakes offers four lakes featuring man-made waterfalls, boat loading ramps, fishing piers, rest shelter, camping and picnicking areas and foot bridges linked by hike and bike trails.

The 31st annual Carol of Lights was held in December 1989. More than 15,000 lights were illuminated to outline the buildings of the central campus.

Texas Tech University, one of the four major state universities in Texas, has an enrollment over 23,000 including students from all 50 states and more than 60 countries. The university, founded in 1923, now has a campus of 1,837 acres right in the heart of the city.



Events from all over the world influenced life at TTUHSC. Across the oceans or across the street, news broke and distinguished 1989 from any other year.



On January 20, 1989, moments before George Herbert Walker Bush, 64, was sworn in as 41st President of the United States of America, he and wife Barbara accepted the well-wishes of the outgoing couple. (Life, 1989)

SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE A catastrophic earthquake rocked Northern California on October 17, killing at least 62 people and injuring hundreds, caving in bridges and freeways, igniting fires and causing widespread damage to buildings.

The quake which struck during the evening rush hour, just as Game 3 of the World Series was about to begin, registered 6.9 on the Richter scale and was on the notorious San Andreas fault. It was the second deadliest in the nation's history, exceeded only by the 1906 San Francisco earthquake that destroyed much of the city and killed more than 700 people.



#### C. EVERETT KOOP

A retired pediatric surgeon and active antiabortionist, he was loudly opposed for the post of Surgeon General by Senate liberals. But once confirmed, Koop outraged conservative supporters by citing studies that concluded cigarettes are addictive and can harm nearby nonsmokers; AIDS can best be contained by early sex education and condoms as well as monogamy; and women undergoing safe abortions seem not to suffer lasting physical or psychological damage. He left office in 1989 a hero to many but spurned by those who had initially backed him.

Attorney General Ed Meese reveals the U.S. sold arms to the Ayatullah; the profits went to buy guns for Nicaragua's contras.

1987: Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North acknowledges to Congress that he was a key Iran-contra player but insists he was patriotically following orders. West German Mathias Rust, 19, pilots a single-engine Cessna 500 miles into the U.S.R.R., landing in Moscow's Red Square. The Senate rejects conservative jurist Robert Bork's nomination for the Supreme Court. Twenty states raise the speed limit on highways to 65 mph.

1988: Suddenly, America seemed under nature's gun as fires char Yellowstone, drought blankets 43 states and garbage washes onto eastern beaches. Peace breaks out: the U.S.S.R. withdraws troops from Afghanistan; Iran and Iraq both claim victory. Benazir Bhutto, Pakistan's new prime minister, is the first woman to lead a Moslem state. Mistaking an Iranian passenger jet for a fighter, the U.S. cruiser Vincennes downs it; 290 die.






At the time of being admitted as a member of the Medical profession,

### Colophon

Volume 8 of Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center's Plexus yearbook was printed by Josten's Printing and Publishing Division, Topeka, Kansas. Jim Hill served as our local Josten's representative. There are 200 pages printed on 191# Gloss Enamel and trimmed to the size of 8½ by 11. Twenty pages of the book were printed in four color (5 Opening, and 15 Family Album) and signatures 6 and 7 were spot color (Forest Green #349).

Coverbase material was 120 point binders board material #516 with Sundance Grain and Beige #374 applied silk screen and gold metal lay of school seal. The logo (The Road Taken) was designed by Vonda Somerville and Ken Brantley. The endsheets were prepared with a ghosted landscape provided by Josten's. Permission was obtained for the use of Robert Frost's poem, The Road Not Taken.

All body copy is set in 10 point Century Schoolbook #15 with blocked paragraphs. The captions are 8 point Garamond #17. Headlines varied in sections as follows: Opening and To TTUHSC-Palatino #33; Getting Involved Korinna #21; Administration & Faculty-Optima #31; Commencement & Alumni-Garamond #17; Sponsors-Century Schoolbook Condensed #55; and Yearbook Staff-Century Schoolbook #15.

Student portraits were taken by Val Hildreth and Associates of the Image makers. Other photographs were taken by staff photographers and submitted by students at TTUHSC. Color enlargements were printed by Rapid Color and CPI One Hour Photo Finish.

The 1989-90 Plexus staff worked with a \$13,200.00 budget provided by book sales, advertisements, sponsorships, and Vending Machines Account. Organizations purchased page sponsorships for \$25 on a first-come-first-serve-basis. Advertisements within the Ad section sold for \$200 b/w full page, \$100 b/w half-page, \$50 b/w for a quarter page and \$25 for business card size.

The yearbook was produced by volunteer staff of 15 students. All layouts, designs, copy, and photographs were generated by the staff, except were noted. Volume 8 had a press run of 300 copies and sold at \$20 a copy.
