

The 1984-85 Academic year was the inaugural year of the student Government at the Texas Tech Medical School.

During this past year, an Honor Code was created specifically for the medical students. This new code provided for student representation on the Honor Council, which under the previous University Code, only did so under the discretion of the appropriate Dean.

A speaker — leadership series was begun, with Dr. David Vanderpool of Dallas, giving the first lecture. The topic was on Medical Ethics from a clinician's viewpoint.

Also for the first time, the student government was successful in coordinating the vacation schedules at all three campuses for the students during their clinical rotations.

Student participation into the direction this medical school takes into the future has never been greater. The student government successfully lobbied for student mempership onto the P.R.E.P. committees on Admissions, Evalua-





The Texas Association of Mexican American Medical Students is an organization formed to perform two basic functions: address the health care needs of the minority and disadvantaged people in Texas, and increase the number of minority students in allopathic and osteopathic medical schools. Persuant to these endeavors, we try to increase awareness of medical problems unique to Hispanics, Blacks, and the disadvantaged, and help in public health education for these groups. In addition, we help guide premedical students with academic counseling and workshops on application to medical school. Our organization tries to create a supportive group of peers for hispanic and black students. We also are planning a physician-student support system, wereby physicians in the community take first and second year medical students under their wings.

This year we have had two guest presentations, "Alcoholism and the Hispanic," given by Rudy Arredondo, M.D.,

and "Child Abuse Recognition," given by Rafael Garcia, in conjunction with the Pediatrics Club. Marina Chavez and Michele Groark attended a premedical workshop at Pan American University in McAllen, representing both TA-MAMS and Texas Tech. A weekly medical Spanish class was created by Jacqueline Bickham and Sam Kleinman for our own peers. As always, we managed to host some memorable fiestas to let off the steam from our pressure cooker environment. Some of us even learned how to do the salsa!

As always we remained active on the state level, sending representatives to three quarterly meetings. We again have elected three of our local members to state offices: President—Juan Fitz, Vice President—Manuel Garcia, and Secretary—Kellie Flood.
