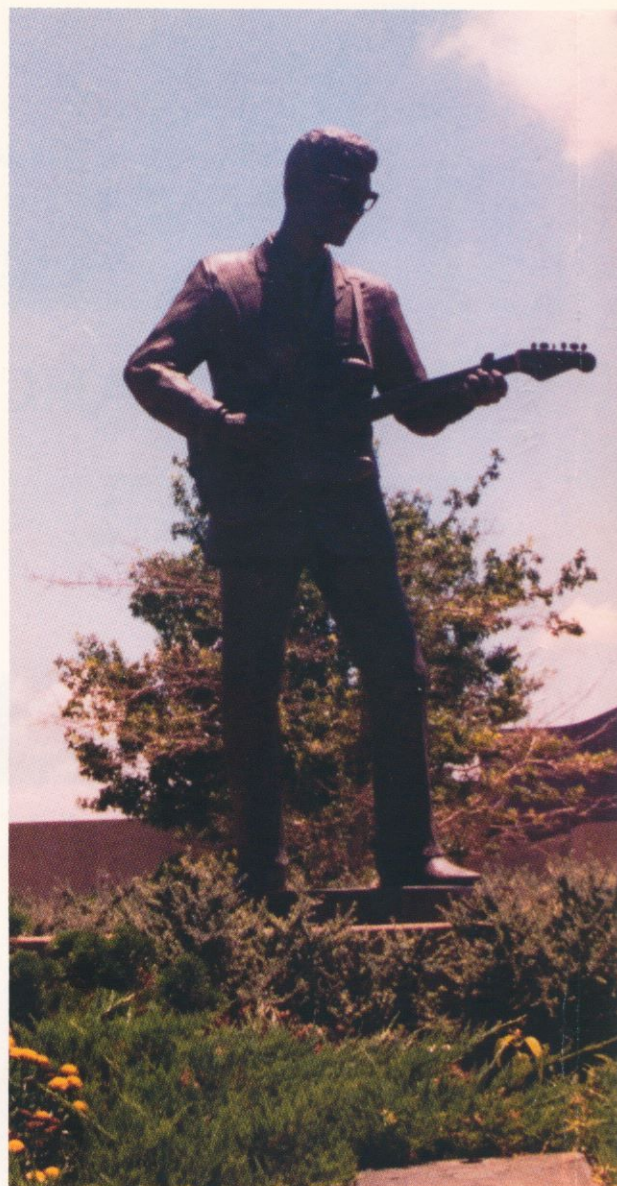

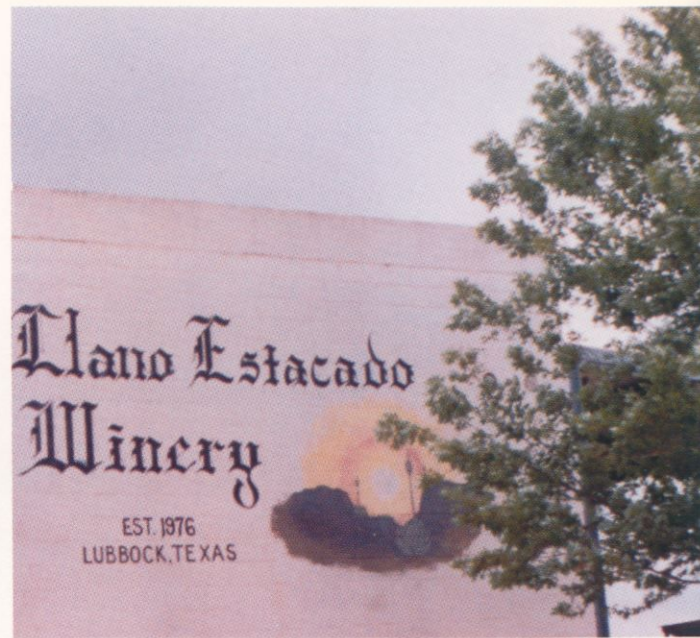
Buffalo Springs Lake 9 miles southeast of Lubbock offers facilities for fishing, skiing, picnics, speed boat races, camping, paddle boats and many other special programs including a nature trail and a new beach area that has been developed.

Snow skiers are happy to discover that Lubbock is just five hours by car from excellent New Mexico ski resorts.

The Municipal Garden & Arts Center hold flower and art shows all year. Lubbock's climate is semi-arid and mild. Cool nights and warm days predominate, with low levels of relative humidity. Most of the annual rainfall occurs during the months of May, June, and July.

Llano Estacado Winery located 3.2 miles east of U.S. 87 Hwy on FM 1585 houses Texas' largest winery. European and Californian varieties of grapes grown within 60-mile radius of Lubbock.

Yellow House Canyon Lakes offers four lakes featuring man-made waterfalls, boat loading ramps, fishing piers, rest shelter, camping and picnicking areas and foot bridges linked by hike and bike trails.

The 31st annual Carol of Lights was held in December 1989. More than 15,000 lights were illuminated to outline the buildings of the central campus.



Texas Tech University, one of the four major state universities in Texas, has an enrollment over 23,000 including students from all 50 states and more than 60 countries. The university, founded in 1923, now has a campus of 1,837 acres right in the heart of the city.

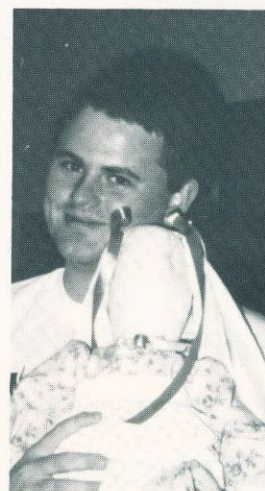

On January 20, 1989, moments before George Herbert Walker Bush, 64, was sworn in as 41st President of the United States of America, he and wife Barbara accepted the well-wishes of the outgoing couple. (Life, 1989)



SAN FRANCISCO EARTHQUAKE

A catastrophic earthquake rocked Northern California on October 17, killing at least 62 people and injuring hundreds, caving in bridges and freeways, igniting fires and causing widespread damage to buildings.

The quake which struck during the evening rush hour, just as Game 3 of the World Series was about to begin, registered 6.9 on the Richter scale and was on the notorious San Andreas fault. It was the second deadliest in the nation's history, exceeded only by the 1906 San Francisco earthquake that destroyed much of the city and killed more than 700 people.

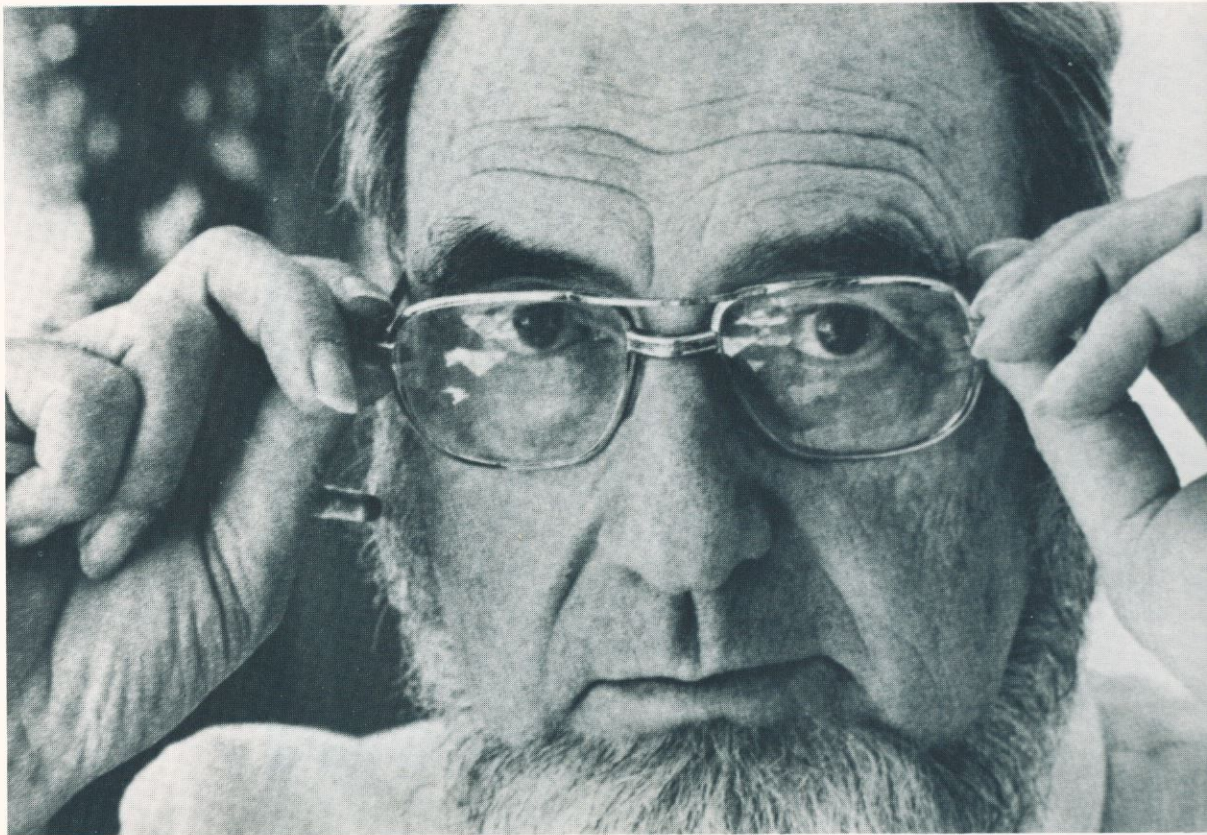

Since the break-in of Dr. John Orem's labs in July of 1989, support for his work has continued among faculty and students at the Health Sciences Center.

C. EVERETT KOOP

A retired pediatric surgeon and active antiabortionist, he was loudly opposed for the post of Surgeon General by Senate liberals. But once confirmed, Koop outraged conservative supporters by citing studies that concluded cigarettes are addictive and can harm nearby nonsmokers; AIDS can best be contained by early sex education and condoms as well as monogamy; and women undergoing safe abortions seem not to suffer lasting physical or psychological damage. He left office in 1989 a hero to many but spurned by those who had initially backed him.
