


#### Premise ...

A year is unique only as it stands in relation to past and future years. As a year is composed of events, these events are important only as they stand as continuations of past events, as distinct breaks from convention, or as they mark the beginning of future trends; the same holds true for persons and institutions, which continue, reshape, or initiate these events. As 1992 marks the end of a score of students graduating from the medical school, The Plexus hopes to display this milestone year's embeddedness in the history and future of the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center.







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#### In The Beginning.

Though officially created in May of 1969, the School of Medicine and, thus, the Health Sciences Center finds its beginnings throughout the 1950's. By the end of this decade, a bill to create a medical school in Lubbock was sponsored by Rep. Bill Parsley and actually passed both houses of the 59th Texas Legislature with the support of Lt. Gov. Preston Smith; however, it was vetoed by then Gov. John Connolly, Finally, in 1969, after Preston Smith became Governor of Texas, the School of Medicine became a reality with House Bill 498. This year, the Texas Tech University School of Medicine is twentythree years old, and because of that age it carries a history and expectations for the future.

The mission of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center is the provision of quality medical education. This effort in each of its four regional academic health centers at Amarillo, El Paso, Lubbock, and Odessa encompasses undergraduate, graduate, and continuing medical education and graduate studies; has appropriate emphasis on both primary and highly specialized patient care; and is enriched by the conduct of relevant biomedical investigation and other scholarly pursuits.


The decision to develop specialty care areas consonant with the fundamental primary care mission has been made with due deliberation and concern for the breadth of an academic program which provides for the general education of the physician and also for the advancement of health care and medical science in West Texas.



In 1981, the School of Nursing was officially approved for funding by the 67th Legislature, following a period beginning in 1975 when the Board of Nurse Examiners of the State of Texas approved program development. The Continuing Nursing Education Program was initiated in 1979. In 1981, the first students were admitted to the baccalaureate degree program; admitted were students with no previous nursing course work, LPN's, and RN's. A graduate program was initiated in 1988.

(left) First graduating class of the medical school.









The School of Allied Health was officially approved for funding by the 67th Legislature in 1981 to meet critical shortages of Allied Health professionals in rural Texas. The first students were admitted to the baccalaureate programs in 1983 and the School received accreditation for its programs in 1985. Its mission is to provide baccalaureate degree studies in three areas: clinical laboratory science, occupational therapy, and physical therapy, and certificate level studies in emergency medical services.




Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center Graduates from Schools of Allied Health, Medicine (GS) and Nursing (GS)








#### THE TIMES


#### **AMBASSADORS**






