- Foundational to the Admissions Process
- Help students to understand how and why things happen
- Generally give a context for how applicants will be evaluated
- Each school varies in the specifics

#### Competitive

- Many applications more than 6000 for medical schools in 2019
- Large percentage are "qualified"
- More applicants than positions available
- More "qualified" applicants than seats
- Therefore, you are "competing" for a place in a professional school class

#### Competitive

- This characteristics lends itself well to evaluating applicants' numbers
- Clearly a quantitative factor in the admissions process
- Numbers show your academic ability and your skill in utilizing knowledge
- Allows schools to reduce the size of their viable pool of applicants


- What numbers are important?
  - Grade point average
  - Standardized test score(s)
- Grade point average
  - Numerous GPAs are evaluated
    - Cumulative (everything you've ever taken)
    - Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Math (BCPM)
    - Non-BCPM courses
  - All grades count, all attempts, no +/-




#### **Grade Point Average**

- In Texas, average overall GPA is typically around 3.70
- Definition of average
- 50 percent have above a 3.70
- Standard deviation is usually about .20
- What does this really mean?


#### Grade Point Average - Medical



#### **GPA Trends**








#### **Standardized Tests**

- What about standardized test scores?
- For example, MCAT
- Averages, in Texas, are about 510
- Standard deviation is about 6 points

#### Take Home Messages

- What should this characteristic of the admissions process mean to you?
- Study hard, make good grades, learn
- Be consistent
- If GPA trouble at first, work to improve
- Prepare for standardized tests
  - Knowledge, test taking skills, emotional stamina

- Defined:
  - "relating to, directed to, or intended for a particular person"
  - Synonyms: individual, intimate
- Each school has objective criteria and methodologies
- But ultimately, an individual and personal approach to your application will be taken
  - Current term in use is "holistic admissions"

- No statistical charts here
- Reading the application, evaluating the intuitive elements of what you say
- Personal Statements, evaluation letters, and activity descriptions
- Seeking to understand who you are and what makes you tick

- Schools get to know who you are, in part, by what you have done
- Where you spend your time
  - Volunteer work
  - Campus organizations
  - Health-related activities
  - Research efforts
- As well as your hobbies, personal interests





#### Take Home Messages

- Who you are and where do your passions lie?
- Don't necessarily do something because you want to check off some box to say you did it
- Discussing this in the application...
  - Focus on the "so what" more than simply the "what" of your activities
  - Depth of meaning and value
- Create your "brand" and then market that brand

#### Marketing Your Brand

- Marketing defined:
  - A coordinated series of steps that include promotion of a product through different mediums using a variety of different types of advertisements.
- The "product" is YOU
- Mediums = elements of the admissions process
- Various adv. types can be wide ranging

#### **Altruistic**

- What does this word mean?
- From the Latin for "other"
- It means to focus your attention on others
- Opposite of being focused on yourself (egoistic)
- This is what we all want out of our healthcare providers...right?




#### **Altruistic**

- The admissions process seeks to understand your motivations
- Are they selfish? Or Selfless?
- What have you done and what do you say that reflects an "others-oriented" perspective?
- Goals of the professional schools
  - A class that works well together teamwork
  - Healthcare providers that benefit others specifically and society in general

#### Take Home Messages

- How do you reflect this in your application?
- Activities
  - Humanitarian volunteering
  - Social action efforts
  - Tutoring others
  - Even religious work
- Personal motivation statement
  - Why you want to be a healthcare provider
  - What is at the base of your reasons









### THE VALUE OF A HOLISTIC REVIEW

## MOST COMMON MISTAKES

- Viewing "submit" as the finish line.
- Taking the MCAT before fully prepared.
- Failure to account for processing times (i.e. MCAT, TMDSAS, AMCAS, Letters of Recommendation).
- Applying late in the cycle!
- Taking too long to complete the secondary application.
- Applying before creating a comprehensive application.
- Texas HB 1508
  - Texas state law requires entities providing education programs leading to an initial occupational license to notify each applicant or enrollee: if convicted of certain criminal offenses it may render that person ineligible for a license....

## PREPARE FOR THE INTERVIEW

- Blinded Interview
- Semi Blinded Interview

- Situational Behavioral Questions

## PERSONAL STATEMENT - IMPORTANCE

- Aspect of application that will be truly "unique".
- Only opportunity to speak directly to admissions committee members.
- Poor execution can result in unfavorable consequences.

## PERSONAL STATEMENT - PURPOSE

- Discuss how committed you are in achieving your goal.
- Strategic placement of ideas and topics in anticipation for interview.
- Your personal campaign

### PERSONAL STATEMENT - DEVELOPMENT

- What is your motivation?
- Was there an "A-ha" moment?
- Provide evidence: "Love of science" and "Desire to help people."
  - Is it clear without using these statements?
- Avoid summarizing application

#### SUMMARY

- Freshman
  - Start creating a roadmap
  - Build relationships with potential letter of recommendation writers
  - Stay focused-"Put blinders on to the outside world."
  - Grades!
- Sophomores
  - Reevaluate goals and grades
  - Become active in the community-"Be leaders."
  - Shadowing
- Juniors
  - Start MCAT Prep
  - Finalizing letter of recommendations
  - Fill in deficits in application, i.e. research
- Seniors
  - Completing application
  - Casper Test
  - Preparing for interviews
  - Reevaluating competitiveness-Consider graduate/post-bac programs

#### Take-Home Points

- Quality is always more important than quantity if it means depth of experience
- You should be able to discuss every entry, demonstrating your enthusiasm, any outcomes & what you learned
- Consider the link between your major activities and your future role as a physician:
  - In what way did that activity help you developed related to patient care, communication, profession health care systems, teamwork, empathy, ethical decision-making, time management, resilient handling stress?


























































### Internet Forums

- Cannabis vs. Alternative Meds















- 1. Own the problem
- 2. Triage the problem
- 3. Come up with solutions
- 4. Seek help & advice
- 5. Correct the issue
- 6. Follow-up





# Strategies for preventing & correcting errors:

- Attend professional and applicant seminars
- Seek advice from the experts (advisors)
- Verify information with supporting evidence
- ▶ Read, Read, Read

# Life Hacks to combat misinformation

- Read and follow instructions
- Take responsibility
- Verify Information, check sources, ask the experts
- Seek out and take advantage of new opportunities and experiences
- Ask for help when you need it
- Be professional
- Don't listen to false prophets
