Alex Varkey, Pharm.D., MS, FAPhA

Alex Varkey, Pharm.D., MS, FAPhA

Dr. Alex Varkey, PharmD, MS, FAPhA, is a nationally recognized pharmacy leader who has dedicated more than 20 years to advancing the pharmacist's role in patient care, health-system innovation, and professional well-being. He currently serves as Senior Director of Strategic Accounts at Visante, where he partners with health-system leaders across the country to improve pharmacy operations, expand clinical services, and implement cutting-edge technologies that enhance patient outcomes.

Prior to this role, Dr. Varkey served as Director of Pharmacy at Houston Methodist Hospital, a 950-bed academic medical center, where he led the implementation of advanced technologies—ranging from electronic health record transitions and robotic sterile compounding to RFID



tracking and Raman spectroscopy for diversion prevention. He established a nationally recognized Controlled Substance Diversion Prevention Program and oversaw the expansion of a suite of clinical pharmacy services and education initiatives, including the hospital's award-winning PGY1/PGY2 Health-System Pharmacy Administration and Leadership residency program.

A dedicated servant leader, Dr. Varkey's passion for professional service began early—as national president of the American Pharmacists Association Academy of Student Pharmacists (APhA–ASP)—and has continued for nearly two decades. He most recently served as the 169th President of the American Pharmacists Association (APhA), becoming the first Indian-American to hold this office in the organization's 172-year history. He previously served as a trustee on the APhA Board of Trustees and chaired APhA's Well-Being Steering Committee, where he championed pharmacist well-being as essential to a high-functioning healthcare system.

Dr. Varkey has also demonstrated exceptional leadership in times of crisis. He led pharmacy operations during natural disasters like Hurricane Harvey and multiple extreme weather events, as well as the COVID-19 pandemic—coordinating large-scale efforts to vaccinate and treat over 150,000 individuals across Houston.

He earned his Doctor of Pharmacy from the University of Houston and a Master of Science in Health-System Pharmacy Administration from The Ohio State University, completing a two-year residency at Nationwide Children's Hospital in Columbus, Ohio.

BOWL OF HYGIEIA

The Bowl of Hygieia is an internationally recognized symbol for the profession of pharmacy. Universally depicted as a snake wrapped around a bowl, it comes to us from Greek mythology. Hygieia is the daughter of Zeus and the goddess of purity. Her bowl represents medicine, and the snake indicates potency. Taken altogether, the Bowl of Hygieia symbolizes "pure and potent medicines."

The Bowl of Hygieia is awarded to a graduating Doctor of Pharmacy candidate who best exemplifies the qualities most desirable in a pharmacist. Most important of these attributes include leadership, high ethical standards, dedication, and promotion of the profession of pharmacy.

Faculty and students alike choose the recipient of this distinguished award. Candidates are nominated by fellow students and endorsed by a letter of support from a faculty member. Selections are then made by an awards committee consisting of the Regional Deans. All TTUHSC School of Pharmacy campuses are represented on the committee.

The recipient is given the honor of carrying in the Bowl of Hygieia at the commencement ceremony. The recipient also holds the privilege of leading the class in the recitation of the Oath of the Pharmacist. The Bowl of Hygieia, along with a special plaque engraved with each recipient's name, will stand on display throughout the year at the Amarillo campus of the School of Pharmacy.

About Our School

Amarillo

When the Texas Legislature established Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC) School of Pharmacy in 1993, it created the first publicly supported pharmacy program in the United States in nearly five decades. State legislators also mandated that the School of Pharmacy be located in Amarillo. The first classes began in August 1996 and the school's steady growth since that time has helped the state of Texas address its pharmacist shortage: more than 90 percent of students who have graduated from the TTUHSC School of Pharmacy have remained in the Lone Star state.

Since its inception, the TTUHSC School of Pharmacy has embraced new classroom technologies to advance its curriculum and prepare students for the ever-increasing opportunities that exist in pharmacy today. It was the first program in the nation to require all of its students to have laptop computers and to deliver materials and email services in support of coursework. The school also



requires its students to complete more clinical training hours than most other pharmacy programs in the country.

In November 2009, the School of Pharmacy expanded the Amarillo campus by opening its Pharmacy Academic Center. The 23,000 square-foot facility provides state-of-the-art classrooms and clinical simulation facilities and gave the school the ability to increase its Amarillo class sizes from 90 students in 2009-2010 to 115 students beginning in 2010-2011.

The TTUHSC campus in Amarillo also includes a new 48,000-square-foot biological sciences research building and the School of Pharmacy presently occupies approximately 80 percent of the facility's assigned laboratory and office space. School of Pharmacy researchers collaborate with TTUHSC School of Medicine investigators whose research is focused upon cancer biology and therapeutic drug delivery.



Lubbock

The School of Pharmacy's Lubbock regional campus opened in January 1998. The campus is located in the main TTUHSC building in Lubbock and deploys students to clinical sites in Lubbock and the surrounding communities. School of Pharmacy faculty members in Lubbock have many clinical interests, including adult internal medicine, primary care, geriatrics, pediatrics, community pharmacy and infectious disease research. Their clinical practice sites include University Medical Center, TTUHSC clinics/pharmacy, TDCJ Montford and local area nursing homes.

Lubbock faculty and residents also operate the TTUHSC Pharmacy, which provides medications and biologicals to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice Montford Unit Regional Medical Facility; the TTUHSC International Pain Institute; and TTUHSC clinics in Lubbock, Odessa and El Paso.

Abilene

The concept for expanding the TTUHSC School of Pharmacy program into Abilene first came about in 2004 when a group of community and private organizations approached SOP with a vision to offer four-year pharmacy education and research to their community and region.

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved the expansion in January 2006 and the school began making plans for extending its Pharm.D. and Post-Graduate Pharmacy Education programs into the Texas Big Country. Since that time, a 40,000 square-foot campus has been constructed and classes began in August 2007. The Abilene campus has continued to expand and now includes buildings and facilities for the School of Pharmacy's Department of Immunotherapeutics and Biotechnology, the TTUHSC School of Nursing and TTUHSC's Department of Public Health.



Dallas/Fort Worth

Roughly one-half of the TTUHSC School of Pharmacy student population has historically come from within a 100-mile radius of the Dallas/Fort Worth (DFW) Metroplex, an area of the state where the shortage of pharmacists has often been described as critical. To help ease the shortage, the school started developing its DFW regional program in 1997 with clinical placements for a few fourth-year students.

In 1999 the School of Pharmacy officially opened its DFW regional campus using facilities leased from Baylor



University Medical Center, and in 2002 the campus was relocated to the grounds of the North Texas Veterans Affairs Hospital in Dallas, where a 4,800 square-foot building was renovated and dedicated to the School of Pharmacy. Additional construction during 2003 increased the size of the school's Dallas VA campus to approximately 8,000 square feet.



In August 2008, TTUHSC expanded its DFW program to a second location inside the Southwest Professional Building adjacent to the University of Texas Southwest Medical Center. The 9,300 square-foot facility includes a 75-seat state-of-the-art classroom, research labs and administrative support areas. The location affords faculty and students better access to the Dallas Medical Center and several of the School of Pharmacy's important partners, such as Children's Medical Center, Parkland Memorial Medical Center and the UTSW Medical School clinics and hospitals.

In February 2018, the School of Pharmacy revamped its DFW program to include all four years of its doctor of pharmacy

(Pharm.D.) curriculum. The initial class of up to 40 first-year students was admitted in August 2018.

Hybrid "Pioneer Pathway"

The School of Pharmacy's Pioneer Pathway for the PharmD program was established in 2024, with the first cohort beginning classes in the Fall of that year. The pathway offers flexibility and convenience by combining online classes that can be taken from anywhere in the country with immersion weeks on the Amarillo campus for the first two and half years. This is followed by twelve months in-person, didactic and experiential courses, and three additional rotations.

Oath Of a Pharmacist

I promise to devote myself to a lifetime of service to others through the profession of pharmacy. In fulfilling this vow:

- I *will* consider the welfare of humanity and relief of suffering my primary concerns.
- I *will* treat all patients with dignity and respect and will not discriminate against any patient.
- I will apply my knowledge, experience, and skills to the best of my ability to assure optimal outcomes for all patients.
- I *will* respect and protect all personal and health information entrusted to me.
- I *will* accept the responsibility to improve my professional knowledge, expertise, and self-awareness.
- I *will* hold myself and my colleagues to the highest principles of our profession's moral, ethical and legal conduct.
- I will embrace and advocate changes that improve patient care.
- I will utilize my knowledge, skills, experiences, and values to prepare the next generation of pharmacists.

I take these vows voluntarily with the full realization of the responsibility with which I am entrusted by the public.

Academic Dress

The wearing of academic dress at commencement dates from the early history of the oldest universities somewhere in the twelfth or thirteenth century. Since educated people were almost always of the clergy, the black gown is somewhat of an adaptation of the cape, a mantle of silk or other cloth worn by church dignitaries in procession and on other occasions. The long gown and cowl (similar to the academic hood of today) were worn by priests and monks for warmth in the cold medieval buildings.

In the early centuries, a great diversity of color and style of cap, gown, and hood appeared in different universities of Europe. The European custom of wearing academic dress was later introduced at American colleges. Not until after 1895 was a uniform academic dress code adopted by most colleges and universities in the United States. Today, the black robe, hood, and cap are worn at most institutions of higher learning.

The gown is cut differently for the bachelor's, master's, and doctor's degrees. Usually the bachelor's robe has long pointed sleeves; the master's has closed sleeves, square at the end with a slit at the elbow; the doctor's is faced with velvet and has round open sleeves with three bars of velvet.

The doctor's hood has side panels and is slightly longer than the one worn for the master's degree. The color used in the velvet border of the hood indicates the field of study. The velvet border is widest on the doctor's hood. The color of the lining of the hood indicate the college or university that conferred the degree. For example, those who have received advanced degrees from Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center wear hoods lined with red. The Olive green signifies the pharmacy degree.

The Tam is black and has a tassel fastened to the side. The tassel is usually worn with the pendant over the left front of the cap. Different colored tassels are often worn on the bachelor's and master's caps to indicate the type of degree. The tassel on the cap of the doctor's candidate, except for professional degrees, is either gold or black.
