


### TTUHSC RECOGNIZES YEARS OF SERVICE

Murray Professor, presented on the Progress from a Life in Blood-Brain Barrier Science and Academics. The event ended with the recognition of Dr. Smith's years of service and accomplishments, which include but are not limited to:

**1997:** Joining the TTUHSC School of Pharmacy as Professor and Chair of the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

2001: President's Excellence in Teaching Award

2007: University Distinguished Professor

2008: American Association of Pharmaceutical Scientists Fellow

**2009:** Transition from Department Chair to Associate Dean for Research for the School of Pharmacy.

2012 - 2022: Served as Dean of the School of Pharmacy

**2017 - 2019:** Concurrently served as TTUHSC Senior Vice President of Research.

2020: Heritage Award from the West Texas Pharmacy Association

During this time, Dr. Smith:

- Taught in over 27 different PharmD courses and 6 different PhD courses and received numerous teaching awards
- Became recognized as the developer of the In Situ Brain Perfusion Technique.
- Has had more than 12,500 citations in other published papers, giving him an H-Index of 57.

Dr. Smith retired on August 31 and the Board of Regents conferred the title of Professor Emeritus to him for his long and faithful service to TTUHSC.


















# VAN DYKE WINS PUBLICATION OF THE YEAR AWARD



Alaina Van Dyke, PharmD, assistant professor of pharmacy practice at the Dallas campus, was selected as the 2024 Department of Pharmacy Practice Non-Tenure-Track Faculty Publication of the Year award winner. Her work, titled "Prioritizing Faculty Well-Being: Why it Matters, What Schools Can Do, and a Call for Action" was published in the American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education (AJPE) and will be implemented in the upcoming SOP strategic plan.

# RESEARCH TEAM MAKES NEW BBB DISCOVERY



A team of scientists from the TTUHSC-SOP Amarillo campus has published new evidence suggesting that the brain's protective shield — known as the blood-brain barrier (BBB)—remains largely intact in a commonly used mouse model of Alzheimer's disease. The discovery challenges long-standing assumptions that Alzheimer's disease causes the BBB to "leak," potentially reshaping how researchers think about drug delivery for the disease.



### TEAM EARNS NINDS RENEWAL GRANT

A collaborative team in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences at the TTUHSC Amarillo campus was recently awarded a five-year competitive renewal grant from the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke - NINDS to continue its stroke research.

# HCHF AWARDS \$50K GRANT FOR GROUNDBREAKING CANCER RESEARCH



Hiranmoy Das, PhD, professor of pharmaceutical sciences, received a grant from the Harrington Cancer and Health Foundation to support groundbreaking cancer research. The funding will help advance the study of circulating tumor cells (CTCs), rare but powerful cancer cells that play a central role in the spread of cancer from one part of the body to another. By isolating and growing these cells in the lab, Das and his team hope to better understand how cancer metastasizes and develop targeted therapies to stop it. Read more <a href="here">here</a>.

# DIB TEAM'S RESEARCH PAVING WAY FOR NEW STRATEGIES

Maciej Markiewski, MD, PhD, professor at the Abilene campus, and his team from the Department of Immunotherapeutics and Biotechnology (DIB) are uncovering how a TP53 gene variant (P72 vs. R72) impacts macrophage activation—a key player in immune defense. Their findings reveal that P72 triggers heightened inflammation, which may contribute to cancer progression, sepsis, and cardiovascular disease, particularly in populations where this variant is more common. This breakthrough links genetics, immune response, and health disparities, paving the way for new precision medicine strategies.

- Grace Onaiwu, P4, won second place in the Patient Counseling Competition


## TAH 1 OF 5 SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Students educated community members who came by their booth on the importance of heart health and maintaining blood pressure as well as common medications that are mistaken for candy.





### FALL MEDICATION CLEANOUTS CONCLUDE

The Texas Panhandle Poison Center (TPPC) hosted collection events at the TTUHSC Lubbock, Abilene and Amarillo campuses in October. Community members were able to drop off unwanted medicines and sharps to dispose of them in a free, legal and environmentally responsible manner. School of Pharmacy student volunteers had the opportunity to collaborate with students from other TTUHSC schools and see first-hand the issues with non-adherence to medications.

- The Abilene event collected 849 pounds of unused or expired medication and 148 pounds of sharps.
- The Lubbock event collected 1739.5 pounds of unused or expired medication and 221 pounds of sharps.
- The Amarillo event collected 1606.5 pounds of unused or expired medication and 330 pounds of sharps.



On May 29 and June 26 some of our TTUHSC-SOP Dallas team members volunteered at Feed My Starving Children. Together with other teams, they packed a combined 234 boxes and 49,942 MannaPack® meals specially designed to help reverse and prevent undernutrition around the world.

TTUHSC-SOP and TTUHSC GSBS welcomed students in the Amarillo College HSI STEM Grant Program to shadow TTUHSC students. The program provides resources and support to help underrepresented students succeed in science, technology, engineering and math programs.
