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Neels Van der Schyf, B. Pharm., D. Sc.

Associate Professor and Graduate Advisor Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences - Amarillo

Neels, who was born and raised in South Africa, is a true representative of the diversity und among the faculty members at the School of Pharmacy. He received his B. Pharm., M. Sc., and D. Sc. (Ph.D.) degrees from Potchefstroom University (the name was recently changed to North West University), where the oldest, largest (and best!) School of Pharmacy in South Africa can be found.

After licensing as a pharmacist, he joined the pharmaceutical industry as drug development researcher before accepting a position as Senior Lecturer (Assistant Professor in the US) in the Pharmacology Department of the Medical School, University of Pretoria. In the mid-1980s, Neels joined the group of Alex

Makriyannis at the School of Pharmacy, University of Connecticut, and the National Magnet Lab at MIT in Cambridge, MA, for postdoctoral study. Upon his return to South Africa, he again joined Potchefstroom University, this time as a faculty member. After a stint as an Associate Professor he was named Professor and Chair of the Department of Medicinal Chemistry. A brief research visit in 1993 to the lab of Neal Castagnoli at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg convinced Neels that his research and teaching goals could best be pursued in the USA. Therefore, in 1995, he accepted a position as Research Associate Professor in the Harvey W. Peters Center for the Study of Parkinson's Disease and Disorders of the Central Nervous System, being jointly appointed in the Department of Chemistry and the Virginia Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine. In 2002, the longing to again be part of a pharmacy school environment became too much and Neels accepted a position at TTUHSC School of Pharmacy where he currently is Associate Professor and Graduate Program Advisor in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences.

Neels, who has published more than 70 peer-reviewed papers and more than 110 abstracts, says he loves research and teaching. Since arriving at TTUHSC School of Pharmacy he has been named Teacher of the Year and received several Teaching Team awards. He is married to stunning Vicky, a linguist and librarian, and they have three children: Marie-Louise, a recently graduated architect who lives in Virginia; Will, a senior at Savannah College of Arts and Design (SCAD) in Savannah, GA; and Christof, a junior at Amarillo High.
