- Dr Duke Appiah is the principal investigator for a DEI grant from the TTUHSC Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion to assess geographical, racial and ethnic health disparities in Lubbock county and West Texas.

Two DPH faculty—Dr. Theresa Byrd and Dr. Julie St. John—serve on the HSI committee, which is charged with carrying out its mission stated in its charter adopted in July 2022: "To be instrumental in strengthening the sense of community among all identity populations through the creation and enhancement of initiatives aimed towards serving and intentionally uplifting the Hispanic community and historically marginalized populations across the institution. As a Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI), TTUHSC will provide culturally humble and responsive resources, programs, and opportunities for learners (at both the graduate and undergraduate levels), team members, community partners, and alumni with emphases on marginalized populations such as Hispanic/Latina/Latino/Latinx team members, who make our campuses representative of the communities we serve." In addition to serving on the HSI committee, Byrd and St. John are also part of the planning community for Hispanic Heritage Month will be in September and October 2022 and include a variety of activities and events. TTUHSC this year will observe National Heritage Month from September 15-October 15 with events, webinars and celebrations. - Dr. St. John volunteered with Olive Branch Ministries International on a service and mission trip to Piura, Peru July 6-28, 2022. During the trip, St. John lead a pilot project where they worked with local community members to build a composting latrine in a small rural community—La Campina—outside of Piura. In addition, the team conducted a community survey while other volunteers hosted a medical clinic. This rural area lacks basic infrastructure such as sewage and routine water service and has a number of water-borne diseases. The hope is this pilot project will successfully reduce contaminated water and stomach illnesses related to unsafe sanitation and water-borne pathogens. St. John received a TTUHSC Office of Global Health grant—along with Co-investigator Dr. Kendra Thornton (TTUHSC School of Nursing, Lubbock) in 2020 to build composting latrines, which the team hopes to travel to Peru in 2023 to construct additional latrines in these rural communities.
